He is adjusting back to normal life in suburban Chicago after recent stints with the club's farm team in Indonesia, and designing a maximum-security prison in Missouri.
- Beaver Cup veteran Dennis Clarke (BS '84) returns to us after a one-year break. Dennis was serving as ball boy at last years Masters golf tournament. Dennis is a Mechanical Engineer for Delta Power in New Jersey. They are an Alternative Energy Supplier to California's power grid. He'll be trying to collect overdue payments from Edison and PG&E during his visit.

- Beaver Cup veteran Mike "EC" Westphal (BS '90) flew in from Albuquerque. He continues in his role as Beaver Cup social director, and part-time Intel Manager/full-time daddy.
- Beaver Cup veteran George "Buzzy" Dale (BS '87) flew in from Tucson, AZ.
- Rounding out the roster are Southern Californians Dr. Rick Russell (Captain and Beaver Cup co-organizer), his long time defense partner and entrepreneur Dale Archer (BS '86, MS '88), and biotech entrepreneur Haj Sano (Beaver Cup co-organizer.)
- Healthy scratches this year are Mike Foley (BS '87 MS '92), Marshall Jackson (BS '87), Dr. Joe Minahan (BS '82) and the overly educated Dr. Brian Fabes (BS '84, PhD '87.) Mike, the newly promoted Corporate President and COO of Reflexite/Fresnel Optics and brother of Chris Foley, is moving his company from New York to Connecticut. The Caltech Beavers joined the IAHF for the 2000-01 season.. The Beavers played in the competitive division II league, with a strong second place regular season finish. In the play-offs, the Beavers got past the Rangers in the semi-finals to play the Chiefs in the finals. Winless against the Chiefs in the regular season, the Beavers showed immense heart and beat the Chiefs 4-2 to gain the League Championship. The team playing without player/coach Pavel Svitek showed a strong effort from all lines. Dominating in roster size over the Chiefs, the Beavers allowed them to maintain a high energy level throughout the game. Goals by perennial offensive threats Adam Olsen and Dean Holunga, as well as a surprise goal by Alex Tobias on a near impossible angle shot, never allowed the Chiefs to catch up. An empty net goal by Hafen McCormick sealed the win and the championship for the Beavers.

The team is once again led by player-coach Pavel Svitek. As a youngster growing up in Czechoslovakia, Svitek made it down to the final forty cut for their Junior National Team. Pavel spent most of the season playing defense. Alex Nicholson and Dean Holunga return for another year, providing steady defense and excellent puckhandling from the defensive position. Joining him on defense were newcomers Tyson Hare and George Whitesides.

Mark Guman, a dominant offensive force last year, is joined by new comer Adam Olsen at center, who has added scoring punch and speed. Mark Stewart, an undergraduate alumnus playing in his eighth year, returns as forward. Hafen McCormick, Darren Mutz, Nathan Good, Joe Danzer and Jeff Berghthorson returned for another great season, as they were joined by new forwards Matt Muto, Alex Tobias, David Jenkins, Nevin Weinberg and Jason Quimby. Kobie Boykins, a past team member, rejoins the team for the Beaver Cup game.

Goaltending was split between grad student James Petersson and Biff Yamazaki.

The Caltech Beavers are a club team, drawing players from members of the Caltech community, including undergrads, Graduate Students, Faculty, Staff, and the Jet Propulsion Laboratory. The team is based at the Iceon Arena in Sylmar.

### *Beaver Cup - A Brief History*

The Beaver Cup tradition started in 1987. Hajime Sano (BS '82)\* and Rick Russell (BS '86, MS '88) originated the concept as a unique way to draw the Caltech and MIT communities together. Sano, an MIT graduate, was working as a software engineer for NASA/Caltech's Jet Propulsion Laboratory at the time. He was also serving as alternate captain-assistant coach for the Caltech Hockey Team. Russell was an MIT graduate student at the time, and serving as Captain of the MIT hockey team.

The name CIT-MIT Beaver Cup came about because both Caltech and MIT mascots are named The Beavers. Beavers are known as the engineers of the animal kingdom. Hockey championships are represented by a cup- Stanley Cup (NHL), Turner Cup (IHL), Calder Cup (AHL), etc... Hence the name Beaver Cup.

Beaver Cup I was played in front of a capacity crowd of 350 at the Pasadena Ice Skating Center, with the MIT Varsity emerging triumphant, 11-3. Caltech traveled to Cambridge for Beaver Cup II, which was also played in front of a capacity crowd of 1100 at MIT. MIT was again victorious, 13-0. The first two Beaver Cup games set attendance records for both rinks.

The format changed starting with Beaver Cup III, pitting a team of MIT Alumni (former MIT Varsity players) against Caltech. The MIT Alumni Beavers have dutifully flown into Southern California annually from around the country and the world to play the Caltech Beavers. Though Caltech has yet to register a victory in the Beaver Cup, there have been many closely played contests. The event has become an annual highlight for the MIT Club of Southern California, MIT's second largest alumni club, as well as the most attended Caltech home game.

The fifteenth Beaver Cup is being played at the Health South Training Center in El Segundo.
